How Zero Waste Education Works
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Welcome to Chris from Zero Waste who has been in our school this week.

The Zero Waste Education (ZWE) programme has been educating children about the topic of sustainable resource use since 1993. This awardwinning programme is now offered to over 500 schools throughout New Zealand to students in Years 1-8 each year.

Additionally there are three units for preschools. These are only available in some council areas across New Zealand. See <u>office</u> to learn more.

Zero Waste Education is provided by our council and usually from the Waste Levy funds. This free Council programme enables children to investigate the link between the earth's natural resources, the products they use and see around them and the resulting waste (natural resources we no longer want) that pollutes our environment.

This comprehensive programme consists of different units each focusing on a specific solution to our waste problem. As the units alternate each year, students will constantly receive new material. They will have received preschool plus nine school units by the time they leave Year 8.



## **COVID 19 UPDATE**

#### Kia ora

New long-term strategy for COVID-19.

You will be aware that New Zealand will move to a new, long-term approach to COVID-19. These changes have been made based on public health advice and reflect high levels of immunity and declining case numbers across New Zealand.

This new approach will only result in minor changes to the way we operate.

The very positive news is that household contacts of a person with COVID-19 do not need to isolate, but instead are asked to complete a RAT test each day, for five days. Therefore, ākonga who are household contacts but test negative and do not have COVID-19 symptoms should continue to attend. It is the best place for them to be so they can be engaged in their learning and connected with their teachers, classmates and friends.

Mask wearing at school is no longer required.

All the other recommended public health measures will stay in place as we know they reduce the spread of infectious illnesses including COVID-19. These include ensuring our indoor spaces are well-ventilated, maintaining good hand hygiene, encouraging everyone to cough or sneeze into elbows and, most importantly, staying home and getting tested if they have COVID-19 symptoms.
